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INTRODUCTION

To provide a baseline understanding of public opinion toward the issues surrounding wait times and the National Wait Times Strategy, Health Canada placed nine questions on the Canadian Ipsos-Reid Express (CIRE) Omnibus.

METHODOLOGY

The study was conducted over the telephone from November 22nd to November 24th, 2005 for a sample size of n=1,000 (margin of error of ± 3.1 percentage points). The study consists of a nationally representative sample of Canadian adults 18 years of age and over. This research was conducted using the Canadian Ipsos-Reid Express, a weekly omnibus poll.

Sample Distribution and Margins of Error

The sample distribution and associated margins of error across the major regions of Canada is as follows:

Refusal, Cooperation and Response Rates¹

The refusal, cooperation and response rates for this research are as follows:

^{*} Please note that several factors contribute to response rate, including: time of year survey conducted, length of field window, length of survey and subject matter, among other factors.

It is worth observing factors impacting the response rates in this research. In our experience, abbreviated field windows, such as those for weekly omnibus surveys, can play a significant role in driving up the number of unanswered calls. In addition to a higher proportion of unanswered calls resulting from the field window, longer surveys and less familiar subject matter may also result in lower response rates. However, it should be noted that a smaller field window does not affect the representativeness of the survey. In previous studies, we have shown that relatively smaller field windows do not necessarily result in an unrepresentative sample.

KEY FINDINGS

Government Performance

One third (33%) of Canadians rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively ("5","6", or "7" on a seven point scale), with four percent saying their performance has been "excellent." However, a similar proportion give the Government of Canada a negative rating (34%; "1","2","3" on a seven point scale), with 11% rating the Government of Canada's performance in health care as "terrible."

Tracking data provided by Health Canada indicates fewer Canadians (33% down 8 percentage points) since May 2005 rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively (41% in May 2005, "5","6", or "7" on a seven point scale).

When it comes to action taken to reduce wait times in health care services, a plurality (49%) of Canadians feel the Government of Canada has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times. However, a similar proportion (46%) say the Government of Canada has "done little" (29%) or has "done nothing" (17%) in this regard. Since mid-October 2005², more Canadians feel the Government of Canada has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times in the health care system (up 14 percentage points). In contrast, the proportion of Canadians who say that the Government of Canada has "done little" (down 5 percentage points) or "done nothing" (down 8 percentage points) have dropped significantly over the past few weeks.

Similar to evaluations for federal government action, most (52%) feel their provincial government has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times in the health care system. Fewer (43%) say their provincial government has "done little" (30%) or has "done nothing" (13%) in this regard. Very few Canadians (3%) say their provincial government has done a "great deal" to reduce wait times.

Perceptions of Wait Times

Relatively similar proportions of Canadians say that, over the last few years, wait times have increased or remain unchanged. Specifically, Canadians are split between believing wait times for health care services "have been getting longer" (44%) or "have stayed the same" (42%) over the last few years in Canada.

Looking forward, Canadians display little optimism about wait times in Canada over the next few years. Overall, two-thirds of Canadians (65%) say they are not confident that wait times for health care services will get shorter over the next few years ("not very confident" 43%, or "not at all confident" 21%).

In terms of responsibility, Canadians generally feel there is a shared responsibility between the provincial and federal level of government for reducing wait times. Comparing results, provincial governments (77% "very" or "somewhat" responsible) are seen as marginally more responsible than the Government of Canada (71% "very" or "somewhat" responsible) and both are seen as having a somewhat greater responsibility than health care professionals (65% "very" or "somewhat" responsible). In this context, it is interesting to note the gap between responsibility and action. While most Canadians see both provincial and federal levels of government as responsible for reducing wait times, only a bare majority of Canadians think the federal government (52%) and their provincial governments (55%) have taken action to reduce wait times.

When asked, three in ten Canadians (31%) have heard, read or seen something recently on the agreement between the federal government and the provinces to set benchmarks for wait times. However, when asked to describe the agreement, among those who are aware, half (54%) are unable to offer a description of what they read, saw or heard or just mention where they saw the agreement reported. It is notable, that Canadians who recall reading, seeing or hearing something about an agreement to set benchmarks for wait times are much more confident that wait times for health services will get shorter over the next few years (42% aware vs. 29% unaware).

A slight majority of Canadians (52%) say that being aware of the ten year, forty billion dollar federal and provincial government plan to reduce wait times has a positive impact on how they feel about the future of the health care system ("much more positive" 7% or "somewhat more positive" 45%). One third (34%) say knowing this information has no impact on their views for the future of the system.

FAITS SAILLANTS

Rendement du gouvernement

Le tiers (33 %) des Canadiens évaluent positivement le rendement du gouvernement du Canada en matière de soins de santé (« 5 », « 6 » ou « 7 » sur une échelle de sept points), dont quatre pour cent affirment que son rendement a été « excellent ». Toutefois, une proportion presque équivalente des répondants font une évaluation négative du rendement du gouvernement du Canada (34 % lui donnent « 1 », « 2 » et « 3 » sur une échelle de sept points), dont 11 % estiment que le rendement du gouvernement du Canada en matière de soins de santé a été « affreux ».

Les données de suivi fournies par Santé Canada indiquent que, depuis mai 2005³, un nombre moins élevé de Canadiens (33 %, en baisse de 8 points de pourcentage) évaluent positivement le rendement du gouvernement du Canada en matière de soins de santé (en mai 2005, 41 % donnaient « 5 », « 6 » ou « 7 » sur une échelle de sept points).

En ce qui concerne les mesures prises pour réduire les temps d'attente dans les services de santé, une majorité (49 %) de Canadiens sont d'avis que le gouvernement du Canada « a accompli certaines choses mais pourrait accomplir plus » pour y arriver. Cependant, une proportion semblable (46 %) affirme que le gouvernement du Canada « a accompli peu » (29 %) ou « n'a rien accompli du tout » (17 %) en cette matière. Depuis la mi-octobre 2005, un plus grand nombre de Canadiens sont d'avis que le gouvernement du Canada « a accompli certaines choses mais pourrait accomplir plus » pour réduire les temps d'attente dans le système de santé (en hausse de 14 points de pourcentage). Par contre, la proportion de Canadiens qui disent que le gouvernement du Canada « a accompli peu » (en baisse de 5 points de pourcentage) ou « n'a rien accompli du tout » (en baisse de 8 points de pourcentage) a diminué sensiblement au cours des dernières semaines.

Comme dans le cas du gouvernement fédéral, la majorité des répondants (52 %) estiment que le gouvernement de leur province « en a fait pas mal, mais pourrait en

faire plus » pour réduire les temps d'attente dans le système de santé. Un nombre moins élevé de répondants (43 %) disent que le gouvernement de leur province « en a fait très peu » (30 %) ou « n'a rien fait » (13 %) en cette matière. Très peu de Canadiens (3 %) disent que le gouvernement de leur province « en a fait beaucoup » pour réduire les temps d'attente.

Perceptions à l'égard des temps d'attente

Des proportions relativement équivalentes de Canadiens affirment que, dans les dernières années, les temps d'attente ont augmenté ou sont demeurés inchangés. En effet, les Canadiens sont partagés quant à savoir si, dans les dernières années, les temps d'attente pour les services de santé au Canada « ont allongé » (44 %) ou s'ils « sont restés les mêmes » (42 %).

En ce qui concerne l'avenir, les Canadiens manifestent peu d'optimisme en ce qui concerne les temps d'attente au Canada au cours des prochaines années. Dans l'ensemble, deux tiers des Canadiens (65 %) disent qu'ils ne sont pas certains que les temps d'attente pour les services de santé raccourciront au cours des prochaines années. (« pas vraiment certain », 43 %, ou « pas du tout certain », 21 %).

Pour ce qui est de la responsabilité, les Canadiens sont généralement d'avis que le gouvernement fédéral et le gouvernement de leur province sont tous deux responsables de la réduction des temps d'attente. En comparant les résultats, on observe que les répondants estiment que le gouvernement de leur province en est un peu plus responsable (77 % « grandement » ou « plutôt ») que le gouvernement du Canada (71% « grandement » ou « plutôt »), et que les deux en sont plus responsables que les professionnels de la santé (65 % « grandement » ou « plutôt »). Dans ce contexte, il est intéressant de noter l'ambiguïté qui existe entre responsabilité et action. Si la majorité des Canadiens estiment que les gouvernements fédéral et provinciaux sont responsables de la réduction des temps d'attente, seulement une faible majorité croit que le gouvernement fédéral (52 %) et le gouvernement de leur province (55 %) ont agi pour les réduire.

Lorsqu'on demande aux Canadiens s'ils ont entendu, lu ou vu quoi que ce soit dernièrement sur l'entente entre le gouvernement fédéral et les provinces pour établir des points de repère sur les temps d'attente, trois sur dix (31 %) répondent par l'affirmative. Toutefois, lorsqu'on demande à ceux qui sont au courant de l'entente de la

décrire, la moitié (54 %) sont incapables de donner une description de ce qu'ils ont lu, vu ou entendu ou se contentent d'indiquer l'endroit où ils en ont entendu parler. Il convient de souligner que les Canadiens qui se rappellent avoir lu, vu ou entendu quelque chose sur une entente pour établir des points de repère sur les temps d'attente pour les services de santé sont beaucoup plus certains que les autres que les temps d'attente raccourciront au cours des prochaines années (42 % de ceux qui sont au courant vs 29 % de ceux qui ne le sont pas).


Une légère majorité de Canadiens (52 %) déclarent que le fait de connaître l'existence du plan de dix ans de quarante milliards de dollars sur lequel les gouvernements fédéral et provinciaux se sont entendus pour réduire les temps d'attente a une incidence positive sur leur opinion quant à l'avenir du système de santé (« beaucoup plus positive», 7 %, ou « un peu plus positive », 45 %). Le tiers (34 %) des répondants disent que le fait de connaître l'existence de ce plan n'a aucune incidence sur leur opinion quant à l'avenir du système de santé.

DETAILED FINDINGS

Government Performance

Government Performance: Health Care

When asked, one third (33%) of Canadians rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively ("5","6", or "7" on a seven point scale), with four percent saying their performance has been "excellent." However, a similar proportion give the Government of Canada a negative rating (34%; "1","2","3" on a seven point scale), with 11% rating the Government of Canada's performance in this area as "terrible." Currently, 33% of Canadians feel the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care has been neither good nor bad.



Tracking data provided by Health Canada indicates fewer Canadians (33% down 8 percentage points since May 2005) rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively (41% in May 2005, "5","6", or "7" on a seven point

scale).

Interestingly, the level of negative ratings for the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care remains statistically unchanged since May 2005 (34% vs.

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38% May 2005). The decrease in favourable ratings comes as a result of an increase in the percentage of Canadians with a neutral impression of the Government's performance (33% compared to 20% in May 2005).

Analysis across socio-demographic attributes shows that those who rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively ("5","6", or "7" on a seven point scale) tend to be:

- residents of Atlantic Canada (43%), Ontario (43%), or British Columbia (36%) compared to those who live in Alberta (29%) and Saskatchewan/Manitoba (24%);
- Canadians in households with annual incomes less than \$30,000 (39%) compared to Canadians from more affluent households (28%, \$30,000-\$60,000; 34% \$60,000); and
- those with less education (25%, less than high school education) compared with their more educated counterparts (34% some post-secondary education; 34% university graduates).

Analysis across key across key attitudinal differences shows that those who rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care positively ("5","6", or "7" on a seven point scale) tend to be:

- those who feel that wait times "have been getting shorter" (46%) or "stayed the same" (42%) compared to those who feel wait times are getting longer (21%); and
- those who feel the Government of Canada "has done something" on wait times (46%) compared to those who say the government "has done nothing" (18%).


In contrast, we find few noteworthy patterns among those who rate the Government of Canada's performance in the area of health care negatively ("1","2", or "3" on a seven point scale).

Government Action Wait times

Federal Government Action

Canadians were asked to evaluate the action taken by the Federal Government on reducing wait times in the health care system. Overall, a plurality (49%) of Canadians feel the Government of Canada has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times in the health care system. A similar proportion (46%) say the Government of Canada has "done little" (29%) or has "done nothing" (17%) in this regard. Very few Canadians (3%) say the Government of Canada has done a "great deal" to reduce wait times.

Residents of Atlantic Canada (65%) are more likely to say the Government of Canada has done a "great deal" or "something but could do more" compared to residents of BC (47%), Alberta (46%), Saskatchewan/Manitoba (47%) or Quebec (49%).



Provincial Government Action

Using the same scale, Canadians were also asked to evaluate action taken by their provincial government to reduce wait times in health care services.

Similar to evaluations for federal government action, most (52%) feel their provincial government has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times in the health care system. Fewer say their provincial government has "done little" (30%) or has "done nothing" (13%) in this regard. Very few Canadians (3%) say their provincial government has done a "great deal" to reduce wait times.


Interestingly, we find little regional variation for evaluations of provincial government action to reduce wait times.

Action Taken: Wait Times (Federal vs. Provincial)

In terms of perceptions of action taken by the federal and provincial governments to reduce wait times, there are several notable differences based on region. These differences show, when compared to evaluations for the Government of Canada, residents of Alberta, Saskatchewan/Manitoba and Quebec are more likely to say their provincial government has done "a great deal but could do more" or "a great deal" to reduce wait times for health care services.

In contrast, Atlantic Canadians are more likely to say the Government of Canada rather than their provincial government has done "a great deal but could do more" or "a great deal" to reduce wait times in the health care system.


Interestingly, residents in both British Columbia and Ontario are of the view that the Government of Canada and their provincial government have expended similar levels of effort to reduce wait times in the health care system.



Federal Government Action: Wait Times Tracking Data⁴

When comparing recent tracking data provided by Health Canada, we note that since mid-October 2005, more Canadians feel the Government of Canada has "done something but could do more" to reduce wait times in the health care system (up 14 percentage points). In contrast, the proportion of Canadians who say that the Government has "done little" (down 5 percentage points) or "done nothing" (down 8 percentage points) have dropped significantly over the past two weeks.

There is virtually no change in the number of Canadians who say the Government of Canada has done "a great deal" to reduce wait times (3% in November 2005 compared to 4% in Mid-October 2005).


Perceptions of Wait Times

Perceptions of Wait Times for Health Care in Canada

When asked, Canadians are split between believing wait times for health care services "have been getting longer" (44%) or "have stayed the same" (42%) over the last few years. Few Canadians (11%) believe wait times for health care services in Canada "have been getting shorter."



Do you feel that wait times for health care services in Canada have been getting shorter, have been getting longer, or have stayed about the same over the last few years?



Analysis across socio-demographic attributes shows that those most likely to say wait times for health care services in Canada have "been getting shorter" are:

- older Canadians (15%, 55+ years) compared to younger Canadians (9%, 18-34; 10%, 35-54);
- urban residents (12%) compared to their rural counterparts (7%); and
- residents of Ontario (13%) compared to those who reside in Alberta (5%).

In contrast, we find few noteworthy patterns among those who say that wait times for health care services have been "getting longer."


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Confidence Wait Times will get Shorter

Canadians display little optimism that wait times in Canada will get shorter over the next few years. Overall, two-thirds of Canadians (65%) say they are not confident that wait times for health care services will get shorter ("not very confident" 43%, or "not at all confident" 21%). Just one-third (34%) say they are "very confident" (5%) or "somewhat confident" (28%) wait times will be decreased.



Now thinking about the next couple of years would you say that you are very confident, somewhat confident, not very confident or not at all confident that wait times for health care services will get shorter?





Residents of Quebec (30%) are more likely to say they are "not at all confident" that wait times for health care services will get shorter over the next few years compared to residents in British Columbia (18%), Alberta (16%), and Ontario (16%).

Canadians aged 55+ (38%) are more confident ("very" or "somewhat") that wait times for health care services will get shorter over the next few years compared to Canadians aged 35-54 (31%).

Responsibility for Wait Times

When it comes to responsibility for reducing wait times for health care services, just under eight in ten Canadians (77%) rate their provincial government as "somewhat responsible" or "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services. Slightly fewer (71% "somewhat responsible" or "very responsible") say the Government of Canada is responsible in this regard. Two thirds of Canadians (65%) say health care professionals are "very responsible" or "somewhat responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services.



Interestingly, we find we find that more educated (46% university graduate compared to 34% some post-secondary; 28%, high school or less) and more affluent Canadians (40%, \$60,000 annually compared to 27%; less than \$30,000 annually) are more likely to say their provincial government's are "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services.

We also find younger Canadians are more likely to say the Government of Canada is "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services when compared to their older counterparts (40%, 18-34 years compared to 20% among 55+).

Responsibility for Wait Times (Federal vs. Provincial)


In terms of perceptions of responsibility for wait times, there are several notable differences based on region. These differences show residents of Quebec, British Columbia and Alberta are more likely to say their provincial government's are "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services, rather than the federal government. While in contrast, residents of Saskatchewan and Manitoba are more likely to say the federal government is "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services.

Similar percentages of respondents who live in Atlantic Canada and Ontario say the federal government or their provincial government is "very responsible" for reducing wait times for health care services.

% Saying very responsible



Awareness of Wait Times Agreement

When asked, three in ten Canadians (31%) say they have heard read or seen something recently about the agreement between the federal government and the provincial governments to set benchmarks for wait times.

Residents of Alberta (15%) and Quebec (17%) are the least likely to say they are aware of the agreement compared to the rest of Canada (31%).



Analysis across socio-demographic attributes shows that those most likely to **be aware** of an agreement between the federal government and the provincial governments to set benchmarks for wait times are:


- university graduates (43%) compared with their less educated counterparts (17% less than high school education; 23%, high school graduates; 30%, some post-secondary education);
- older Canadians (40%, 55+; 36%, 35-54) compared to younger Canadians (15%, 18-34);
- more affluent Canadians (38%, \$60,000+ annual households) compared to Canadians who reside in less affluent households (20%, <\$30,000; 28% \$30,000-\$60,000); and
- men (35%) compared to women (28%).

Analysis across key across key attitudinal differences shows that those who say they are aware of an agreement between the federal government and the provincial governments to set benchmarks for wait times are more likely to say they are confident (42% among those aware) that wait times for health care services will get shorter compared to those who are unaware (29% among those unaware).

Perceptions of Wait Times Agreement

Among those who are aware of an agreement between the federal government and the provincial governments to set benchmarks for wait times, when asked to describe the what they read heard or saw most recently about the agreement half of Canadians (54%) are unable to offer a description (7% "don't know/no response") or just mention where they saw the agreement reported (42% "in the media"; 5% information on the Internet).

One third (34%) of those aware of an agreement between the federal government and the provincial governments to set benchmarks for wait times, mention "reducing wait times" (25%) and/or "more funding is being provided to cut wait times" (9%).



Its is noteworthy, that among the list of descriptions of the wait times agreement just 2% incorrectly observed that the agreement included "plans to privatize health care to improve wait times."


Other mentions under five percent include:

- Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) scanners 4%
- Implement Benchmarks 4%
- Reducing Wait times for joint replacements 4%

- Trying to make changes/improvements 3%
- Discussions between the federal and provincial government on this issue 3%
- No agreement has been reached/nothing has happened 2%
- Reducing wait times for sight restoration 1%

Impact of Plan on Future of Health Care System⁵

A slight majority of Canadians (52%) say that being aware of the ten year, forty billion dollar federal and provincial government plan to reduce wait times has a positive impact on how they feel about the future of the health care system ("much more positive" 7% or "somewhat more positive" 45%). Just one in ten say (13%) say being aware of the plan has a negative impact on how they feel about the future of the health care system ("much less positive" 5% or "somewhat less positive" 8%). One third of Canadians (34%) say being aware of the plan has "no impact" on how they feel about the future of the health care system.

In the fall of 2004 the federal government and the provincial and territorial governments agreed to a tenyear, forty-one billion-dollar plan for health care. This plan included a commitment to establish wait time benchmarks for health care services by the end of 2005. These benchmarks are to be based on the best available medical evidence and they will be measured annually so that Canadians can see where progress toward shortening wait times is or is not being made. Would you say that being aware of this plan makes you feel much more positive, somewhat more positive, somewhat less positive, much less positive about the future of the health care system in Canada or did it have no impact how you feel about the future of the health care system?

Analysis across socio-demographic attributes shows that those most likely say that being aware of the ten year, forty billion dollar federal and provincial government plan to reduce wait times has a positive impact on how they feel about the future of the health care system ("much more positive" or "somewhat more positive") are:

- younger Canadians (59%, 18-34) compared to their older counterparts (48%, 35-54); and
- residents of Atlantic Canada (62%) compared to those who reside in BC (46%) and Quebec (44%).

Analysis across key across key attitudinal differences shows that those most likely say that being aware of the ten year, forty billion dollar federal and provincial government plan to reduce wait times has a positive impact on how they feel about the future of the health care system ("much more positive" or "somewhat more positive") are:

- those who feel that wait times "have been getting shorter" (65%) or "stayed the same" (58%) compared to those who feel wait times are getting longer (43%); and
- those who feel the Government of Canada "has done something" on wait times (61%) compared to those who say the government "has done little" (47%) or "has done nothing" (28%).

APPENDIX A

Formulas for Refusal, Cooperation and Response Rates

All formulas are based on the call dispositions outlined in the methodology section.

Refusal rate:

(Total terminations + Total refusals)/ (Total Completes + Total Disqualified + Total Over Quota + Total Terminations + Total Refusals)

Cooperation rate:

(Total Completes + Total Disqualified + Total Over Quota)/ (Total Completes + Total Disqualified + Total Over Quota + Total Terminations + Total Refusals)

Response rate:

(Total completes + Total disqualified + Total Over Quota)/ (Total Completes + Total Disqualified + Total Over Quota + Total Terminations + Total Refusals + Total Language Barrier + Total No Answer)
