OUR PLAN FOR EARLY LEARNING AND LITERACY

- Nearly triple the funding for combined early childhood development (ECD) and autism intervention programs since 2001.
- Use underutilized school space as centres to deliver early childhood development and daycare services.
- Increase support for Success By 6, in partnership with the United Way and Credit Union Central of B.C., to deliver better ECD services in our communities.
- Expand efforts to prevent Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder.
- Expand access to speech pathology for special needs children in B.C.'s schools.
- Provide new prenatal and early learning resources to parents through AchieveBC.
- Expand the successful Roots of Empathy program to every school in B.C. to promote empathy in children, and to reduce aggressive behaviour and bullying.

Great Goals for a Golden Decade One: Make B.C. the best educated, most literate jurisdiction on the continent

- Eliminate textbook shortages in schools with \$150 million more this year for B.C.'s schools and \$10 million in one-time funding in 2004 for schools to buy over 285,000 textbooks.
- Require school boards to annually track and report on their plans to eliminate and prevent textbook shortages, starting this year.
- Lobby the federal government to match the Province's recent doubling in funding for 41 adult literacy cost-shared programs across B.C.
- Provide \$12 million over three years in new funding to strengthen B.C.'s libraries.
- Provide broadband Internet in every library, establish a 24-hour "virtual reference desk," and create a one-card system to give every British Columbian the right to access library books from every library in our province.

- Increase funding for ESL programs.
- Continue to match all private donations raised by the successful annual Raise-A-Reader campaign, as initiated and funded for the first time ever, last year.
- Work with the new Premier's Advisory Panel on Literacy to assess literacy challenges, identify urgent needs, and develop an action strategy to help meet B.C.'s literacy goals.
- Promote student achievement in literacy with \$5 million in Literacy Innovation Grants, aimed at helping students who are struggling with literacy skills or who may be socially or economically disadvantaged.
- Work with LiteracyNow, a new \$5 million community-based program, to improve literacy in concert with non-profit and volunteer-based organizations across the province.

REAL PROGRESS IN STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

- High school completion rate has increased to 79% since 2001 the highest ever.
- Aboriginal completion rates are up by 5% over 2001.
- B.C. students won more scholarships in 2003 than ever before.
- B.C. students are getting the best marks ever in reading, writing and numeracy.
- B.C. students outperformed their counterparts in almost every province and most countries around the world in the most recent International Student Assessment of reading, math and science tests.

CONNECTING COMMUNITIES

As promised, we have acted to bridge the "digital divide" by connecting every community in B.C. to high-speed Internet access by 2006.

Only a year ago, families in 171 communities did not have access to broadband Internet. They were shut out of education opportunities in the new knowledge economy and functionally disconnected from new benefits in digital communication.

Now all of those communities will be connected to high-speed Internet access.

OUR PLAN TO IMPROVE EDUCATION

- Increase funding for K-12 education by \$253 million over the next three years.
- Complete all required seismic (earthquake)
 Establish a teacher employment registry, upgrading in B.C.'s schools within 15 years.
- Institute "zero tolerance" of bullying in B.C.'s schools.
- Expand the Action Schools! BC program to Grades K-9 in every school by 2010 and develop a suitable model for Grades 10-12.
- Make physical fitness mandatory in the school curriculum for all students K-9.
- Expand the school Fruit and Vegetable Program to provide a free serving of B.C.- grown fruit or vegetables to all students in public schools across B.C., by 2010.

- Eliminate junk food in all public schools within the next four years.
- administered by the College of Teachers, to publicly report the names of teachers disciplined for misconduct involving emotional, physical or sexual abuse.
- Require annual public reports for all public schools on the statistics relating to class sizes, teacher hirings, terminations, disciplinary actions and professional development.
- Give government the ability to directly communicate with all teachers in B.C.
- Hold an annual Teachers' Congress to invite teachers from across B.C. to directly communicate with the Premier and education ministers on their ideas for bringing out the best in education.

- Legislate a ban on inappropriate partisan political activities in our public schools.
- Give teachers new recognition and financial incentives to reward improvements in student achievement and promote professional development.
- Oppose the NDP's plan to eliminate education as an essential service, which would allow strikes and lockouts to shut B.C. children out of class and deny them their right to an education during labour disputes.
- Oppose the NDP's proposal to remove class size limits and protections under the law which would return to the old model where they were used as political bargaining chips in labour negotiations.

FOR STUDENTS & PARENTS THE BEST IN EDUCATION

Excellence. Choice. Accountability. Achievement.

- Restored education as an essential service. This law, passed in August 2001, ensures that no child's right to an education will ever again be jeopardized due to a labour dispute.
- Created more flexibility and choice in public schooling. Amendments to the School Act gave students and parents new choices in education and the right to attend any school in the province, provided space is available. School districts are now also required to create catchment areas that ensure students can attend their neighbourhood schools.
- Introduced new accountability contracts. This makes school boards publicly accountable for student achievement and gives School Planning Councils the power to develop an annual plan for each school, including setting goals and outcomes for student improvement.
- Eliminated the PST on basic school supplies purchased by Parent Advisory Councils who volunteer their time and effort to raise money for public schools.
- Guaranteed the legal right of parents to volunteer in schools, provided it does not result in the displacement of existing staff services.
- Introduced new graduation requirements that give students greater choice and flexibility, while also raising performance standards.

- Introduced school satisfaction surveys to give parents, students and staff a new tool to let government know how well they think their schools are doing.
- Enshrined class size limits in legislation for Grades K-3 and set district-wide class size averages for Grades 4 through 12. This gives school boards better flexibility to utilize their class spaces in the best interests of students.
- Gave school boards multi-year funding envelopes to improve long-term education planning and budgeting.
- Added almost 12,000 computers to B.C.'s schools, with a million dollars in special funding.
- Introduced AchieveBC (www.achievebc.ca) to provide new learning resources and interactive tips and tools, to compare all schools' performance on student achievement, help plan a career, and learn about scholarships and financial aid for post-secondary education.
- Introduced new school safety standards to help address bullying in schools.

\$2 BILLION MORE FOR EDUCATION

- Education funding for all levels will have increased from \$7.8 billion to \$9.8 billion by 2007.
- Average per student funding for K-12 has increased by \$881 since we were elected.
- There are over 30,000 fewer students in B.C.'s schools today than in 2000, due to our aging population.
- This year, operating funding for B.C.'s public schools will grow by \$150 million. That's the largest increase in a decade.
- This year's funding increase will provide more money than ever to help students with special needs, to eliminate textbook shortages, and to ensure every school provides library services, as well as art and music programs.
- K-12 education funding will increase by \$253 million over the next three years, to nearly \$5.2 billion.
- In addition to these funding increases, school districts have received over \$153 million in one-time grants.
- On top of all this, another \$68 million was provided in 2002 to help offset the 7.5% salary increase for teachers.
- School districts were also given \$10 million in one-time funding in 2004 to buy textbooks for students enough to buy over 285,000 textbooks.
- By the end of 2007/08, we will have invested over \$2.2 billion in school capital and ongoing maintenance funding, having built or approved 34 new schools and 278 replacements, additions, renovations and seismic (earthquake) upgrades since 2001.
- In addition, we will spend \$1.5 billion on seismic upgrades for over 700 schools – a 15-year investment in student safety. So far, 95 projects worth over \$250 million have been approved.

25,000 NEW STUDENT SPACES

Last year, the Province announced plans to add 25,000 post-secondary student spaces by 2010. That's on top of the 5,856 seats that were created over the previous three years, for a total of 30,856 more student spaces.

New seats will be created faster than the rate of student population growth, so that anyone with a 75% average or better can gain access to advanced education in B.C.

NEW FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

- Providing \$450 million over the next three years for student financial assistance including loan reductions for students in need, debt relief, a loan forgiveness program and grants for students with disabilities.
- The new student aid program allows students to earn nearly three times more money than previously, without reducing their loan eligibility.
- The new loan reduction program forgives a portion of student loans upon successful completion of courses for eligible students.

MORE FUNDING FOR ADVANCED EDUCATION

Funding for post-secondary institutions has increased every year under our government, and by 2007, the ministry's budget will be over \$200 million higher than it was in 2001.

Over \$1 billion has been invested since 2001 in research, innovation, infrastructure and access, including \$100 million in new funding for the Michael Smith Foundation in 2007. We've built the new Life Sciences Centre at UBC, and opened new medical schools at UNBC and UVic.

The new \$56.25 million Leading Edge Endowment Fund is attracting world-renowned researchers and promoting applied research. We've committed \$150 million to double the number of graduates in computer science and electrical and computer engineering. And we've committed \$800 million in new capital investment for B.C.'s universities and colleges.

OUR PLAN TO IMPROVE ADVANCED EDUCATION

- Increase annual post-secondary funding by \$196 million over the next three years.
- Cap tuition increases at the rate of inflation to ensure B.C.'s tuition levels remain affordable.
- Expand the student loan reduction program by 2008, to offer more help to low income families.
- Increase the number of new doctors trained in Prince George, Victoria and UBC and create a new medical training campus at UBC Okanagan in Kelowna.

- Create additional special purpose universities.
- Maintain and improve The Knowledge Network as B.C.'s educational public broadcasting network.
- Create "one-window" access for students to apply for acceptance or financial assistance at any public post-secondary institution in B.C., through the AchieveBC website.
- Work with the federal government and professional organizations to speed up credentialing for new Canadians in trades and professions.

- Increase the number of apprentices, working with the new Industry Training Authority and employers.
- Establish British Columbia as the new home for the World Trade University, a United Nations-backed initiative aimed at promoting global trade skills and knowledge.
- Establish a One World Scholarship Fund to help B.C. students earn their degrees and diplomas in other non-G8 countries.

- New \$25 million BC Arts Renaissance Fund.

- \$20 million Spirit of BC Arts Fund to support artistic and cultural activities leading up to the 2010 Winter Olympics.

to celebrate the best in British Columbia in music, art, poetry, prose, photography and film.

A new interactive Picture BC website will be launched later this year, in partnership with the Union of BC Municipalities, Tourism BC, and LegaciesNow. It will provide a unique point of connection for all the world to learn more about our province and to invite all British Columbians to contribute to the single largest electronic repository of freely available B.C. art and art sources in the province.

FOR BC PATIENTS HIGHER HEALTH FUNDING

\$3.8 BILLION INCREASE FOR HEALTH CARE

In our 2001 New Era election platform, we vowed to "Maintain this year's overall \$9.3 billion budget for health" and to "Increase future health care funding as economic growth increases government revenues." In fact, we not only kept that promise – we exceeded it.

As the chart opposite shows, by 2007, health care funding will have increased from \$9.5 billion to \$13.3 billion since we came into office – an increase of \$3.8 billion. That's nearly a 40% increase – another \$759 million in this year alone.

This year, we will spend over \$3 billion more on health care than when we came into office. That represents an increase of over \$8 million a day, \$300,000 an hour, nearly \$6,000 a minute, and almost \$100 a second – seven days a week, 365 days a year!

44% OF THE ENTIRE BUDGET NOW GOES TO HEALTH CARE

The fact is, B.C. has the third highest per capita health spending in Canada and the highest per capita physician spending in the country. Health spending now accounts for nearly 44% of all government operating expenditures. New federal health funding will add \$5.4 billion to health care in B.C. over the next 10 years.

Every penny of administrative savings realized from changes made to health delivery is now being reinvested into improvements for patients in our B.C. health system. This includes \$100 million for patients from reduced administrative costs, achieved by reducing the number of regional health authorities from 52 to six, and \$40 million from reduced health ministry bureaucracy. The consolidation of laboratory management has put an additional \$70 million over two years back into improved lab services, allowing for over \$35 million in technology upgrades to improve the coordination of information and delivery of lab services for British Columbians.

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FOR PATIENTS IN EVERY REGION

THE LARGEST INCREASE IN NURSING EVER

- Launched a \$62.5 million nursing strategy to train, recruit and retain nurses, and increased the number of nurses in training by 62%.
- Added 600 more nurses and over 2,500 new nurse training spaces. That's nearly 30 times more new nursing seats than the 85 seats added by the NDP over the entire 1990s.
- Created B.C.'s first ever programs to train nurse practitioners at UBC and UVic, with the first class graduating in 2005.
- Gave B.C. nurses the highest starting wage and second highest maximum wage in Canada, with a 23% wage increase in 2001.
- Ensured B.C. health support workers are still among the highest paid in Canada, despite wage measures taken to bring salaries and benefits more in line with the Canadian average, and to direct more funding back into patient services.
- Negotiated a new 3-year agreement with B.C.'s 28,000 nurses that will provide improvements in patient care and nursing, with no extra wage costs for two years.
- New BC NurseLine offers 24/7 telephone access to help from a registered nurse in 130 languages, and after-hours pharmacist support.



DOUBLE THE NUMBER OF DOCTORS IN TRAINING

As the chart shows, we have nearly doubled the number of doctors in training. The number of first-year undergraduate medical students has been increased from 128 to 224 since 2001. By 2008, there will be a total of 896 medical students in training at any given time in B.C., up from 480 under the NDP. We are also doubling post-graduate positions, or residencies, to 256 by 2010.

According to the Canadian Institute for Health Information, B.C. attracted more family physicians and specialists from across Canada than any other province in 2003. In our first two years, the number of physicians in B.C. grew from 8,105 to 8,348. We now have one of Canada's highest rates of physicians per capita.

B.C.'s doctors are now among the highest paid in Canada, following a 20.6% lift in compensation in 2002 that was equivalent to an average increase of \$50,000 per doctor. A new three-year agreement with the B.C. Medical Association means that for the first time ever, B.C.'s physicians have agreed to take no increases in fees or salaries for at least two years. Instead, they are working with the government on ways to improve both patient care and support to physicians.

OUR PLAN TO INCREASE PHYSICIANS & NURSES

- Increase the number of new doctors trained in Prince George, Victoria and UBC and create a new medical training campus at UBC Okanagan in Kelowna.
- Invest \$77 million over three years for continued recruitment, training and retention of nurses.
- Aggressively recruit foreign-trained doctors and nurses through the newly expanded B.C. Provincial Nominee Program, which allows applicants to gain permanent residence status more quickly and permanently practice in British Columbia.
- Increase the number of nurse practitioners graduating in the province, including new graduates at UNBC.

FOR COMMUNITIES ACROSS BC NEW HOSPITALS AND FACILITIES

OUR PLAN TO IMPROVE HEALTH FACILITIES



- Completed the Prince George Regional Hospital redevelopment, including a new four-storey patient care building with new medical/surgical beds, improved critical care services, a new Emergency department and other improvements.
- Opened the 19-storey Jim Pattison Pavilion at Vancouver General, with 459 new beds, and modern equipment and care facilities, to fully utilize the huge facility that the NDP had left empty throughout the 1990s.
- Redeveloped the Royal Inland Hospital in Kamloops, with a new state-of-the-art Emergency Department opened last year and a new Medical Imaging Department to be opened this June.
- Commencing work on the \$5.3 million revitalization of G.R. Baker Memorial Hospital in Quesnel to turn the hospital's third floor into an updated acute care unit.

- Started construction of a new 300-bed Abbotsford Regional Hospital and Cancer Centre for residents of the Fraser Valley, to be completed by 2008.
- Renovated Mills Memorial Hospital Emergency Department in Terrace, and Bulkley Valley District Hospital Emergency Department and Diagnostic Imaging Department in Smithers.
- Completed a \$21 million expansion of the East Kootenay Regional Hospital in Cranbrook to attract specialists and to create a regional centre of services.
- Building a new 11-storey Academic Ambulatory Care Centre in Vancouver that will coordinate ambulatory patient care services and academic programs in medical education, physician teaching clinics and research, starting in 2006.
- Opened the new Life Science Centre at UBC, the Northern Health Sciences Centre at UNBC, and UVic's Medical Sciences Building.
- Began the renovation and redesign of St. Paul's Hospital's Emergency Department, to be completed this September, and the renovation of Whistler Health Centre Emergency Department.
- Delivered four new centres of excellence for thoracic surgery at sites across the province.

- Started construction of the Nanaimo Regional General Hospital expansion to improve access to patient care, surgical services, and maternal programs, beginning next spring.
- Completed the Saanich Peninsula Hospital Emergency redevelopment in 2003.
- Created a new rehabilitation unit at Victoria General to help patients recover from strokes and brain injuries.
- Launched major improvements to the Fraser Valley Cancer Centre in Surrey and the Vancouver Cancer Centre, to acquire and accommodate eight new or replacement linear accelerators (Linacs).
- Increased number of dialysis stations by almost 60% across B.C. since 2001, with major expansions to renal dialysis services in Creston, Kelowna, Penticton, Prince George, Surrey, Terrace and Williams Lake. Expansion includes 61 machines for independent dialysis to allow patients to receive care at home.
- Completed a new \$17 million mental health facility in Kamloops and constructed or expanded mental health facilities in Campbell River, Terrace, Prince George, Vancouver and Vernon.
- Created new access to specialist care for rural residents in 50 additional communities through expanded telehealth across the province.

FOR ALL BRITISH COLUMBIANS CANADA'S BEST PHARMACARE

FAIR PHARMACARE

Under the new Fair PharmaCare plan, 280,000 British Columbians now pay less, or nothing at all.

It's a fair PharmaCare system because it is income-sensitive, unlike the old PharmaCare program. Under the previous system, people with higher incomes often paid less for their prescription drugs than those with lower incomes. That wasn't fair.

For example, before Fair PharmaCare, a single mother earning \$28,000 with no extended medical insurance would have paid more than a retired couple with an income of \$56,000 for the same drugs. The single mother with half the income of the couple would have paid over twice the amount. She would have paid \$1,300, while the couple would have only paid \$550, on a total drug cost of \$2,000.

Fair PharmaCare changed that. Now, those who earn less pay less for their prescription drugs. To ensure British Columbians' annual drug costs do not exceed their ability to pay, there is now a family maximum based on net income. Once that maximum is reached, PharmaCare covers 100% of all drug costs above that amount. This is the best catastrophic drug coverage in Canada.

The same single mom mentioned in the example above now pays 37% less than she did before. A retired couple earning \$18,000 a year now pays 38% less for their prescription drugs. If their total prescription costs are \$2,000 annually, they now pay only \$250, as compared to \$400 previously.

THE FACTS ABOUT PHARMACARE

- B.C. is one of only three provinces in Canada that has a universal drug coverage program for all of its citizens, where access is not restricted based on age and income.
- Only B.C. offers a zero deductible for low income earners not on income assistance.
- B.C. is tied for first place in Canada for the number of drug classes funded under its prescription drug program.
- B.C.'s PharmaCare system provides coverage for about 18 million prescriptions annually.
- B.C. has one of Canada's best immunization programs, with 100% coverage for many vaccines.
- In addition to Fair PharmaCare, other B.C. PharmaCare plans provide 100% coverage for patients in long-term care, patients on income assistance, and children at home with severe handicaps and more.





FOR ALL CANADIANS A 10-YEAR HEALTH STRATEGY

A NEW HEALTH DEAL FOR CANADA

Last September, Premier Campbell and other First Ministers negotiated a new health agreement for all Canadians. It will add another \$41 billion to Canada's public health care system over the next 10 years.

British Columbia will receive an extra \$5.4 billion in health funding, which will help lift Ottawa's share of all health funding to 25%. That's still only half of what the federal government contributed back in the sixties. But it's a major step forward that will ensure our health care system is sustainable and will result in better health care services and increased accountability.



OUR PLAN FOR BETTER HEALTH CARE

- \$1.5 billion increase for health care over the next three years, including an extra \$759 million this year.
- Expand the BC NurseLine into a comprehensive HealthNow Helpline that offers free round-the-clock telephone access to a broad range of health services in up to 130 languages.
- Increase investments in high-tech medical equipment, such as MRI and CT scanners.
- Increase funding by \$100 million this year to reduce wait times in key surgical and medical priorities, including cardiac treatment, diagnostic imaging, joint replacements, and sight restoration - as identified in the new federal/provincial health agreement.

- Establish national standards for wait times. •
- Improve home care services and support, and other key programs in the community sector, with an additional \$100 million this year from the extra \$759 million budgeted for healthcare.
- Improve Aboriginal health care through a national strategy to raise Aboriginal health outcomes to the averages for other Canadians, within a decade.
- Expand primary care to increase 24/7 access to multi-disciplinary primary health teams.
- Expand telehealth to improve rural and remote residents' access to health services and specialists.
- Develop a National Pharmaceuticals
 Strategy to provide all Canadians access to catastrophic drug coverage, to accelerate access to breakthrough drugs, to strengthen the national evaluation of drug safety and effectiveness, and to pursue national purchasing strategies to obtain drugs and vaccines at the best price possible.
- Improve accountability with new nationally comparable progress reports on key performance indicators.
- Build on B.C.'s 10-year health human resources strategy, with a national strategy to address long-term needs for a stable supply of health professionals in every province.

Great Goals for a Golden Decade Three: Build the best system of support in Canada for persons with disabilities, special needs, children at risk and seniors

- Eliminated provincial income tax for all people earning less than \$15,500 a year.
- Increased the refundable sales tax credit for low income seniors by 50%.

LEADING THE WAY IN CANADA IN PARTNERSHIPS WITH FIRST NATIONS

Real progress means forging a new relationship with First Nations, based on recognition, respect and reconciliation. That goal has been formalized in a protocol agreement with the First Nations Summit and was reinforced in the 2003 Throne Speech with a formal statement that was unprecedented in Canada.

We established annual meetings between Cabinet and First Nations leaders from across B.C. The Premier and Cabinet have also initiated annual First Citizens' Forums that invite an open dialogue on a wide range of issues of interest to Aboriginal British Columbians.

B.C. is leading the way in Canada, with new revenue sharing opportunities for First Nations in forestry, and oil and gas; new economic project agreements to foster job creation and partnerships; new co-management agreements in parks; and new collaborative management agreements aimed at facilitating development opportunities while protecting environmental, spiritual and cultural values.

B.C. is breaking new ground with First Nations in areas like adoption, child protection, early childhood development, education and health care, and in service delivery for Aboriginal women, people with disabilities, people in need, and people at risk.

OUR PLAN TO WORK WITH FIRST NATIONS

- Work with First Nations to ensure that our five great goals for improving health, education, support services, environmental management and job creation are realized in First Nations' communities.
- Expand the Aboriginal Employment Partnership Initiative to develop new job opportunities for Aboriginal people.
- Increase First Nations' representation in the public service.
- Develop with First Nations a new framework for respecting Aboriginal rights and title in the absence of treaties.
- Increase support for Aboriginal child care.
- Develop a comprehensive Aboriginal Children's Strategy, to better coordinate funding and support for Aboriginal children's services.
- Extend broadband Internet access to 100 First Nations' communities across B.C. by 2006.
- Work with Aboriginal leaders to develop a national blueprint to improve the health status of Aboriginal peoples in Canada.
- Negotiate workable, affordable treaty settlements under the BC Treaty Commission process.



FOR BC WOMEN THE FUTURE IS WIDE OPEN

- Increased support to prevent and combat violence against women.
- New province-wide crisis line to provide 24/7 support for victims of family and sexual violence.
- New Safe Streets Act to help protect women from aggressive panhandling and solicitation.
- 32,000 more childcare spaces eligible for funding and 10,000 more children eligible for childcare subsidies.
- Enhanced health care services in maternity, midwifery, breast cancer screening, mental health, and drug and alcohol treatment.

B.C. now has the highest proportion of women in the workforce of any province in Western Canada. We have the highest percentage of women owning or operating a small business in Canada. The median weekly wage for women in B.C. has grown at nearly twice the rate for men. We have more women working in B.C. than ever before, and nearly half of the new jobs we have created since 2001 have gone to women.

B.C. is spending more than ever before on childcare and programs to combat

violence against women. More women than ever are now receiving support through victims' services, with 153 separate programs across British Columbia.

As our economy has improved, the number of single women on income assistance has dropped by 16% since 2001.

There are now 52% fewer single parents dependent on income assistance, as the vast majority of those people leaving welfare are now employed and earning two or three times more income. Provincial income taxes have been reduced by as much as 44% for people earning \$20,000 and have been eliminated entirely for those earning less than \$15,500.

OUR PLAN TO SUPPORT WOMEN

- Provide over \$37 million in new funding to support women and children escaping violence and provide 24/7 access to safe housing.
- Expand the BC NurseLine into a comprehensive HealthNow Helpline that offers free round-the-clock telephone access to nursing, pharmacist, physician, mental health, and crisis intervention support in up to 130 languages.
- Explore viable options to extend parental leave benefits to self-employed and part-time workers.
- Work with the Royal BC Museum to establish a World Women's History Museum, as a satellite expansion, to celebrate the milestones, contributions, and great women achievers in history, both here in B.C. and around the world.
- Increase the income threshold to make more families eligible for child care subsidies.

- Increase support to combat Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and improve women's health in pregnancy.
- Provide new tax incentives and financial assistance to help women advance their education, skills and employability when returning to the workforce after long absences due to child rearing.

A key responsibility of government is to ensure law and order and to promote the safety of its citizens. Families should not have to feel threatened by the prospect of home invasions, break-ins or car thefts. Women, children and seniors should not have to worry about being accosted or assaulted on our streets or when using public transit. Young British Columbians should not have to fear being bullied at school or beaten up by youth gangs.

Citizens should not be terrorized by organized crime or victimized by drug traffickers. Parents should not have to worry for the safety of their kids at playgrounds or parks.

We need to improve and intensify our efforts to keep our citizens safe, and build on the actions we have taken to improve public safety.

OUR PLAN FOR PUBLIC SAFETY

- Invest an additional \$122 million in policing, corrections and courts to add 215 RCMP officers around B.C. to fight major crime, cyber-crime and boost rural policing.
- Increase funding to support programs that combat violence against women.
- Implement the new sex offender registry in B.C.
- New ISPOT policing team, to better monitor known sexual predators.
- New Amber Alert system to help solve child abductions.
- Expand the successful Bait Car program to combat auto thefts across B.C.

- Pass new Civil Forfeiture Act to ensure that criminals don't profit from the proceeds of their crimes.

THE CITIZENS' ASSEMBLY: A WORLD FIRST IN DIRECT DEMOCRACY

On May 17th, all voters will have an unprecedented chance to choose between two electoral systems that will ultimately determine how MLAs are elected in future.

British Columbians will be able to choose between the current "first past the post" system, and a new "single transferable vote" system that has been recommended after over a year of study and deliberation by the Citizens' Assembly.

The Citizens' Assembly was made up of randomly selected British Columbians drawn in equal numbers from every electoral district, who were broadly representative of our province in all its rich diversity. Together, they held 50 public hearings and received 1,603 written submissions.

This initiative, a world first in direct democracy, was performed completely free of political interference. True to that principle, the government will remain neutral on the two options presented, and whatever the outcome, will abide by the people's choice.

- Established Premier's Task Force on Homelessness, Mental Illness and Addictions to work with mayors to address challenges in these areas.
- Returning 100% of all traffic fines to municipalities for enhanced community policing and crime prevention.

- Provided the UBCM with \$2 million to help meet local needs for B.C.'s seniors.

NEW PARKS TOUGHER STANDARDS

- Established 37 new Class A parks and one new ecological reserve; added 150,000 hectares to our parks system and expanded 34 existing parks and four existing ecological reserves.
- Established the new Gulf Island National Park Reserve and an \$8 million BC Trust for Public Lands to conserve ecologically important private lands for public benefit.
- Completed \$73 million deal to purchase Burns Bog to forever protect the "Lungs of the Lower Mainland," in partnership with local governments and the federal government.
- Preserved the Codd Wetlands, in partnership with community and conservation groups, to help protect habitat for 191 species of birds, mammals and amphibians.
- Protected and preserved the Hofert/Hoodoos area.

THE LOWEST INCOME TAXES IN CANADA

Four years ago, we vowed to reduce British Columbians' provincial income tax rates to the lowest base rate in Canada. We delivered. British Columbians now have Canada's lowest provincial income tax rate at every level for lower and middle incomes – a measure the NDP opposed at every turn.

With this year's budget, the BC Liberal Government has lowered taxes for individuals and businesses by about \$1.6 billion annually compared to 2001. By the end of this year, our tax relief measures will have returned a total of \$6.8 billion in tax savings back into B.C.'s economy since the last election.

This year, we have further reduced or eliminated income taxes for 730,000 citizens earning under \$26,000. We have eliminated provincial income taxes entirely for all British Columbians earning less than \$15,500. In fact, an individual earning \$20,000 now pays 44% less in provincial income taxes than when we came to office.

B.C.'s top marginal income tax rate has also been reduced to the second lowest level in Canada. That is encouraging people with higher incomes to live, work and invest in B.C. And we have stimulated economic growth, with more competitive business tax rates, targeted tax credits, and the elimination of punitive taxes on capital investment. The sales tax on machinery and equipment, and the NDP's corporate capital tax on non-financial institutions were both silent job-killers – and now they are gone.

LEADING GROWTH IN HIGH-TECH

Confidence in B.C.'s technology industry is on the rise, with record levels of employment and GDP growth in the sector last year. As the global technology industry has begun to rebound, following a very tough period following 9/11, British Columbia high-tech companies are now benefiting from several changes made to encourage growth and job creation.

B.C.'s top marginal income tax rate has been lowered from the highest rate in Canada to the second lowest rate in Canada today. The tax rate on stock options was lowered from 38.5% in 2000 to 21.9% in 2002. Federal changes to the treatment of taxation on the triggering of stock options are also helping B.C.'s technology firms attract and retain skilled knowledge workers.

We are also doubling the annual number of graduates in computer science, and electrical and computer engineering. And a new agency, Leading Edge BC, is now spearheading technology growth across B.C.

Several other steps have been taken to further expand investment and opportunities. Premier Campbell has led annual Leading Edge marketing missions to promote our technology industry in key international markets. He also appointed a Premier's Technology Council to help develop a comprehensive technology strategy for B.C. that is now in place. With the Council's help, we are acting to bridge the "digital divide" by connecting every community in B.C. to broadband Internet access by 2006.

After a decade under the NDP, where half of all miners lost their jobs, mining is back in British Columbia. Our new energy policy is generating new growth, with \$800 million in new independent power projects, and clean, alternative energy from wind power, tidal, thermal and cogeneration sources. As promised, BC Hydro's core assets have been protected under public ownership by legislation, which also ensures low electricity rates, independently set by the BC Utilities Commission, free of political interference.

The new summer drilling program, new Sierra Yoyo Desan Resource Road, and changes to help deep well and directional drilling are all creating year-round employment. New mining policies, new tax credits, the new \$25 million Geoscience BC initiative along with lower taxes, less "red tape", and faster approvals are all spurring growth.

Nothing will do more to open up B.C. and create new opportunities for stable, long-term growth across the North than the \$1 billion BC Rail Investment Partnership with CN Rail. Mayors, community leaders and shippers along the BC Rail corridor told us that the status quo was not working for their communities and businesses. They said that changes were needed to create a truly integrated, continental rail network for British Columbia that would increase shipping capacity, reduce shipping times, and keep rates as low as possible.

The former BC Rail operation wasn't working for taxpayers either. Under the NDP and previous governments, it cost taxpayers over \$860 million in bad debts and write-downs – almost twice the cost of the fast ferries fiasco.

The Mayor's Advisory Council recommended a strategy for moving forward. We listened and acted on that advice, with a new partnership to improve rail service.



BENEFITS OF BC RAIL INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIP

- BC Rail Company continues as a publicly owned Crown Corporation that retains ownership of BC Rail's tracks, railbeds and rights-of-way.
- \$135 million towards the new Northern Development Initiative to generate new investment, job creation and opportunities across the North.
- \$15 million for 25 First Nations along the BC Rail corridor to control and invest in their priorities.
- \$200 million to support transportation improvements across British Columbia.

- \$500 million to eliminate BC Rail's debt and to eliminate any future risks from bad debts and write-downs that cost B.C. taxpayers \$860 million over the previous 15 years.
- \$750 million in tax revenues over the term of the lease paid by CN to municipalities – over quadruple the amount previously contributed by BC Rail.
- 600 new rail cars, lower rates and costs for shippers, and faster, better access for all interline shippers into the USA.
- \$17.2 million to support the expansion of the Port of Prince Rupert, which will be further enhanced by \$15 million in investment by CN Rail to support track and railcar upgrades.
- A new Chicago Express rail service direct from Prince George, and a new state-of-the-art wheel repair shop in Prince George that repatriates work to British Columbia from Washington State.
- A new tourism/passenger rail service from North Vancouver via Prince George to Jasper.

Under the NDP, British Columbia officially became a "have-not" province, and a recipient of equalization. Our regional economy and resource-based communities were hit especially hard. Today, there is new hope in every region.

Our economy has recovered. We are about to officially become a "have" province once again. And with budget surpluses now projected, there is new capacity to equalize opportunities in every region.

Premier Campbell's government has launched three new regional development initiatives to create new investment opportunities and jobs in the regions outside of the Lower Mainland and the South Vancouver Island.

It started with a new Northern Development Initiative that was initially funded with proceeds from the BC Rail Investment Partnership. Under our plan, that Initiative will be expanded this year, to provide a total of \$185 million for Northerners to leverage and invest in forestry, pine beetle recovery, transportation, tourism, mining, Olympic opportunities, small business and sustainable economic development.

Similar locally controlled new regional development initiatives have also been announced for the North Island-Coast, the Southern Interior, and the 25 First Nations along the BC Rail corridor. Together, these new measures will reinvest \$300 million into equalizing opportunities across British Columbia – measures the NDP opposed and have vowed to largely undo or defer in their new platform. By contrast, we strongly believe that this is a plan worth fighting for on May 17th.
