Justice Harold Hollinrake ag-reed with parts of McEachern's judgment, but dismissed the appeal overall. Justice Patricia Proudfoot dismissed it outright.



British doctor keeps AIDS quiet

BOLTON, England (Reuter) A British doctor did not tell a hospital he had AIDS before treating about 250 patients in its casualty department, health officials said Sunday.

About 100 people worried they might have been infected by the virus rung a special "hotline" in its first two hours. Officials said the chances of infection were minimal. The doctor did minor "invasive" surgical treatment on only a handful of patients, they said. The unnamed doctor, who died last summer, broke health guidelines by not informing Bolton Royal Infirmary of his condition before working six shifts there in late 1991


